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## HOT TOPICS

### **POLICE AND SAFETY**

By now, everyone is aware that along with the warm weather comes more foot traffic on our Village streets. Citizens/thieves are looking for easy targets and nothing is easier than simply opening an unlocked car door and grabbing whatever valuables are available. According to the Bethesda District Crime Analyst, the Village of Martins Additions had seven reported "Theft From Autos" last year, 2016. This year to date, through May 23, 2017, the Village of Martins Additions has had one, yes one, reported "Theft From Auto". The key word is "reported". If you unfortunately find yourself being the victim of a theft from auto, it is imperative that the event be reported to the police department. Emailing or calling the Village office does not constitute a reported crime. A victim can report a crime via the Montgomery County Police Department telephone unit, online, or by having a patrol officer dispatched to a specific location whether it be at home or work. The police non-emergency number is 301-279-8000. It should be noted that the Bethesda District as a whole has had a reported total of 362 theft from autos in 2017 so far as opposed to 392 in the same time period last year.

The Montgomery County Police Department routinely uses statistic based/driven deployments to utilize their officers in the most efficient manner. So hypothetically, if the Village were to have one night where 50 vehicles were broken into and only reported 5 of those but the Town of Somerset had 25 vehicles broken into and reported all 25, it would be understandable where police assets would be deployed. So please, report crimes when they occur and always lock your car doors each and every night. Finally, make sure you do not leave valuables in plain sight in your vehicles and more importantly, in your yards or open garages.

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## COMMITTEE UPDATES

### **ELECTION COMMITTEE**

May 12, 2017

Dear candidates, Council members, and neighbors,

Here are the results of the May 11, 2017, Council Election for the Village of Martin's Additions:

Total ballots cast: 244

187 ballots were cast at the polling table.

71 absentee ballots were requested and delivered; 57 completed absentee ballots were returned by Election Day.

Election Results:

Richard Krajeck	148 votes
Katya Hill	147 votes
Katie Filipczyk Howard	122 votes

Various write-in candidates received a total of 17 votes, as follows:

Jean Sperling	4 votes
Halie Soifer	3 votes
Chris Schrader	2 votes
Paul Weller	2 votes

Six residents - Elissa Bean, Ben Dunford, Ami Grant, Eric Korsten, Marty Langelan, and Michael Zielinski - each received one write-in vote.

There were two ballots on which voters voted for three people, which the Election Committee disqualified because of the "vote for two" limit. In addition, there was one vote for "Sully" Sullenberger, which the Election Committee disqualified on grounds that, regrettably, he is not a resident or property owner in the Village of Martin's Additions.

The Election Committee thanks the residents of Martin's Additions for the excellent turn-out. The total of 244 voters exceeded last year's tally of 228. We commend everyone who came out to vote on such a wet, chilly evening, as well as those who took the time to vote by absentee ballot. We thank all three candidates for running a very balanced and fair campaign.

We wish to express our appreciation to the VMA staff for their exceptionally helpful work in support of the Election Committee's mailings, notices, meetings, and logistics. We thank the shops, too, for their generous, helpful participation on this rainy Election Day.

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## SPOTLIGHT

### **NATIVE CANOPY TREE PLANTING PROGRAM**

In Fiscal Year 2017, the Village began a native Canopy Tree Planting Program on a trial basis. Under this program, the Village of Martin's Additions plants native canopy trees on private property. When a tree is requested by a resident, the arborist evaluates whether there is an appropriate location on the property for a canopy tree. The Village purchases the trees with a \$100 contribution from the applicant, pays for the tree and installation (approximately \$500), and provides a water bag to assist residents with the care needed in the critical first year after planting. Residents are responsible for the long-term care of the tree including watering.



The Village Tree Committee recommended that native trees should be given priority whenever possible in order to provide the greatest benefit to the environment, including providing food and nesting sites for native birds, mammals, and beneficial insects, and to better avoid loss of trees through disease.

The Village website has [detailed information about the available trees](#) and a tree request form.

Residents are encouraged to submit their tree requests early, as there is limited availability.

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## NOTES FROM THE VILLAGE OFFICE

**Celebration on the Sidewalk:** Lots of "thank yous" to dole out this year - as is the case every year! Thank you to the many residents who voted and participated in the Village election, whether it was on Election Day itself or casting absentee ballots. And thank you to all of the stores that participated in the Celebration on the Sidewalk on May 11th. Despite the rain many Village residents turned out to vote, have ice cream and mingle. Thank you as well to our Election Committee volunteers for their tireless work in putting together the event. Finally, a special thank you to Keith Allen and David Bjorklund, who helped put up and take down tents, chairs and other Election

Day accoutrements. All of our volunteers and residents always make the Celebration on the Sidewalk a special event every year.

**Wine Tasting at La Ferme:** On Sunday June 11th, the Village will host a wine tasting in cooperation with La Ferme. La Ferme is bringing in French wine experts representing the Champagne, Bordeaux and Burgundy regions with 4 wines to taste from each region. If you find a favorite wine, arrangements will be made for you to purchase that wine (La Ferme cannot sell the wine directly to consumers on its premises). The event will also include passed hors d'oeuvres to complement the wines. So mark the date: June 11 from 3:30 - 6:00 PM. Because this is a wine-oriented event, attendance will be necessarily limited to adults.

Please RSVP to the emailed invitation if you would like to attend so the office can try to get an accurate headcount and to create name tags ahead of time. (However, RSVPs are not required, so if you are unable to RSVP ahead of time, please still come to the event!)

**Independence Day Celebration:** Add it to your calendar! The Village will be putting on an Independence Day event during the **afternoon of Sunday July 2nd**. The event will primarily take place at the dead end of Turner Lane, at Shepherd Park, and will culminate in a bike, scooter and stroller parade down Turner Lane.

We are still in the process of locking down some vendors, but expect pizza, ice cream, face painting, and other fun activities, including (hopefully) a water slide!

We will continue to update you as we solidify plans, but please mark your calendars, and we look forward to seeing you there!

**Streetlights:** After several years, we are finally able to see the light at the end of the tunnel. After setting up multiple sample displays, and taking a survey of residents' preference, the Village received updated quotes from PEPCO for the cost of our multiple options. Ultimately the Village settled on the LED lights that are sampled at 3525 Bradley Lane.

(Please note that we have received some concern from residents that LED lights may have a negative effect on people's circadian rhythm based on an article that was published on CNN. The Village has reviewed the American Medical Association study that was cited, and has taken precautions to assure that our lights will not have any harmful effects. For instance, the American Medical Association recommends that

municipalities choose LED street lights at 3000 Kelvin or less, and implementing shielding to reduce glare - both of these recommendations have been implemented in our design choice).

The LED lights use significantly less energy than the standard high-pressure sodium lights, which should create energy bill savings down the line; and are more environmentally-friendly as they do not contain any mercury. In addition, they produce superior lighting quality, and are becoming even less expensive to make. One positive in this process dragging out is that because the technology has continued to improve, there is a good chance that we will be able to come in under-budget on the total cost of the project. After negotiating with PEPCO, we are in a position to potentially finish the job at about half the original expected cost.

On March 29th we finally signed off on a permit and cost letter for PEPCO to create our new lights. At that point, PEPCO sent the order to its distributor, Holophane, for creation. PEPCO estimates a 10-12 week lead time after designs were finished (which was right around the same time that the cost letter was signed and sent back), so we should expect Holophane to finally finished creating the lights around mid-June.

At that point, Holophane will send the lights to PEPCO, who will send the job down to their construction team. PEPCO will send out one or two crews to finalize what materials will be needed (e.g. cables, etc) and gather them to complete the job.

PEPCO will begin about two weeks later by installing the seven new poles that we will be putting in per our lighting design in order to eliminate dark spots throughout the Village. Each pole will take about a day to put into place as they need to dig a spot for them, install them, and attach cables.

Once the new poles have been installed, PEPCO estimates it will take roughly three hours per streetlight to put them in, so at about two streetlights per day for 71 streetlights, with PEPCO working Monday through Friday, we anticipate everything being installed by the end of August!

**Street Work:** Although we have finished repaving throughout a majority of the Village, as you may also recall, WSSC will be returning to the Village, unfortunately - sewer line repairs this time!!! - so a few streets (Quincy, Oxford, Chestnut, and parts of Raymond, and Thornapple) were skipped over when it came to concrete work and repaving. Residents on those streets: you have not been forgotten! We will double

back and get that work done on your streets once WSSC is finally out of our hair, hopefully for a long while.

In the meantime, the Village will be patching up potholes on the skipped-over streets, and painting in "stop bars" and street lines throughout the rest of the Village.

WSSC is anticipating starting their work in Martin's Additions towards the end of summer or early fall. They have not selected a contractor for the work yet. But once that is done, the Village office will set up a public meeting for residents to meet with WSSC and its selected contractor.

**Noise and Construction Hours**: Spring and summer often mean an up-tick in construction projects and other outdoor work in the Village. Just a reminder that the Village follows Montgomery County's Noise Law, which allows for 65 dBA (decibels) during the daytime, and 55 dBA at nighttime. An example that may violate that section of the law might include lawn-mowing at night. [This sheet](#) might also give you an idea of what those numbers roughly translate to. Typically the Village suggests contacting the County if there is a noise disturbance because they have the equipment to assess decibel levels and the resources to issue citations. If you wish to report a noise violation, you can contact Montgomery County 3-1-1 during regular business hours, or the non-emergency police line at 301-279-8000 during non-business hours. There is also a two-party complaint form found online on the [Montgomery County website](#).

The rules for construction are slightly different, and are handled a little differently too. Construction in the Village shall not commence prior to 7:00 am on Monday through Friday, and 9:00 am on Saturday and Sunday; and must end no later than 9:00 pm Monday through Thursday, and 7:00 pm Friday through Sunday, and on federal holidays. Between 7:00 am and 5:00 pm on weekdays, construction work is allowed to get up to 75 dBA, and up to 85 dBA if there is a Montgomery-County approved noise suppression plan for the project. Again, if you would like to report a violation you can contact the County. You can also inform the Village office, which can also issue citations for working beyond permitted construction work hours.

**Email Address**: Please update your email address books to reflect that the Village email address is [martinsadditions@gmail.com](mailto:martinsadditions@gmail.com), as has been the case for about two years. With Verizon ceasing its email support, the old Village email address of martinsadditions@verizon.net is no longer in working order, so please remove the address from your address book.

**2016 Resident Directory:** The Village has published and mailed the 2016 directory. We are planning to put out a new directory every two years, so that means the next copy will be in 2018. Extra copies are available in the Village office.

**Permitting:** A reminder to contact the Village office before beginning any work to verify permitting requirements. Work performed on your property may require permits from the Village as well as from Montgomery County. See the "Building Blocks" section of the newsletter for the latest!

**Moving?** Residents of VMA are encouraged to contact the office to have temporary No Parking signs posted in front of their home when moving out of the Village or when expecting a large truck delivery.

**Other items:**

- Elizabeth (Beth) Boa is a Notary Public in Maryland. Please call ahead if you need notary services (301-656-4112).
- To receive Constant Contact notifications from the Village Council, the committees, and the office (i.e., any official communication from your Village government), please contact the Village office. This is the best way to receive information on waste pickup, snow removal, and Council and committee meetings.
- To receive a paper copy of *Martin's Edition* in the mail, please contact the Village office.

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## BUDGET CORNER

### **FY18 BUDGET PASSED BY COUNCIL**

Fiscal year 2018 for the Village of Martin's Additions begins July 1, 2017. The Village charter requires that a budget be approved by May 15, which authorizes Village expenditures over the following year.

The Village Council had three public comment periods during Council meetings to discuss the budget and tax rate. The tax rates will remain the same for FY2018. Next year the Council will look at lowering the property tax rate as the Village has a lot of cash in reserves.

The Village Council voted to approve the Fiscal Year 2018 budget and tax rates at the May 11, 2017 Annual Meeting. [They are posted on the Village website.](#)

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## LITTLE KNOWN FACT



### **MOSQUITOES, TICKS AND PUBLIC HEALTH**

Any day now we will swat away the first mosquitoes of the season. For the past month, organizations that lead hikes in our area have been cautioning eager participants to take measures to protect themselves from ticks. The absence of a cold winter and the warm temperatures and rain of the past couple of weeks have provided the conditions for a

bumper crop of the Village's least-liked residents. Although it may be easy for a time to ignore the annoyance of ticks and mosquitoes, please remember to take precautions to protect yourself and your loved ones from them and the diseases they carry.

Make no mistake, Lyme disease is endemic and active in our area. Here is a fact sheet from Maryland's Department of Prevention and Health Promotion about Lyme disease: <https://phpa.health.maryland.gov/OIDEOR/CZVBD/Pages/lyme-disease.aspx>

It's also time to start checking outside your house every couple of days to look for standing water in plants saucers, downspouts and other places where water collects. The mosquitoes that carry West Nile Virus only need ¼" water to lay eggs, which in days quickly develop into blood-thirsty mosquitoes.

Although many local companies now advertise spraying "safe" pesticides to temporarily reduce ticks and mosquitoes in your yard, the chemicals that are sprayed are not benign. They do not selectively kill ticks and mosquitoes. They also kill beneficial bugs that are food sources for many creatures including birds and small mammals.

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## BUILDING BLOCKS

### **BUILDING ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT**

7520 Bradley Lane

The homeowner has replaced the concrete driveway on their lot. No work was proposed within the Village right of way. The work has been completed and I recommend the applicant's performance bond be returned.

6701 Brookville Rd.

The applicant has submitted a building permit application to add an addition to the existing house. The staff has completed a preliminary review of the application and is waiting for the Montgomery County Department of Permitting Services (MCDPS) building permit approval.

7219 Chestnut St.

The homeowner placed stone tiles over the top of the existing concrete lead sidewalk. A right of way license agreement was prepared for that portion of the sidewalk in the Village right of way. We are waiting for the homeowner to return the executed and notarized agreement, which will be recorded in the land records at Montgomery County.

3414 Cummings Lane

The Village has closed the applicant's building permit. The applicant has replaced their driveway, the driveway apron, and the 5 damaged sections of public sidewalk. I recommend the Village close the driveway apron permit and return the applicant's performance bond.

7210 Delfield St.

The homeowner has planted rose bushes and other plants, outside the new fence at the front of the property and within the Village right of way. A right of way license agreement was prepared for the plantings in the Village right of way. We are waiting for the homeowner to return the executed and notarized agreement, which will be recorded in the land records at Montgomery County.

6702 Melville St.

The Village has issued a building permit to enclose the breezeway between the existing house and garage. The work is ongoing.

3507 Raymond St.

The homeowner has submitted plans and a building permit application to the Village to make interior improvements and to add a deck to the rear of the house. The Village has issued a building permit. The work is ongoing.

3404 Shepherd St.

An application has been submitted to add a second floor, a covered front porch, and a covered patio to the existing house. The application has been reviewed. The staff is waiting for the MCDPS approval and the Village permit fee to be delivered to the Village office.

7317 Summit Ave.

The new homeowner's engineer has contacted the staff to discuss the potential of adding an addition or demolishing the existing house and building a new house. The lot is a corner lot and the setbacks from Summit and Thornapple are a concern. No plans have been submitted to the Village.

3510 Taylor Street

The staff has noticed that the existing brick retaining wall within the Village right of way is collapsing, is a safety hazard, and is in need of immediate repair. The staff is attempting to contact the homeowner. A right of way license will be required.

3512 Taylor Street

The staff noticed that when the retaining wall was re-built, the contractor left a 2-inch-wide depressed area between the existing Village sidewalk and the base of the new wall, which may cause a pedestrian to trip and fall. The staff is attempting to contact the homeowner to correct the situation.

3405 Thornapple St.

The staff issued a building permit to relocate the existing house to the adjacent lot and add improvements to the old structure. The improvements include a new curb cut and driveway. The work has begun and the existing house has been moved to the adjacent lot.

3407 Thornapple St.

The property owner's engineer has contacted the staff regarding building a new house on this lot. There is an issue of building setbacks, including the estimated EBL front setback. Nothing has been formally submitted to the Village or the County.

3405 Turner Lane

The applicant has submitted a building permit application to the Village to remove a portion at the rear of the existing house and add a new addition in its place. The staff has completed a preliminary review and is waiting for the MCDPS building permit approval.

Montgomery County Department of Transportation (MCDOT) - North Delfield St.

The staff has contacted the MCDOT maintenance department about a repairing the existing storm drain inlet at the north end of North Delfield St.

Raymond St. - Storm Drain

The maintenance department at MCDOT has repaired the damaged storm drain inlet at the east end of Raymond.

Maryland State Highway Administration (MSHA) - Brookville Road

MSHA maintenance staff is investigating the water ponding at the northeast corner of Brookville Rd. and Bradley La. MSHA was recently contacted and they are still looking into a solution for the ponding water.

A Morton Thomas (AMT) Geographic Information System (GIS) Update

AMT last updated the Village GIS computer data in 2014. We are presently compiling the information for a new update. The update will include the new front yard construction projects since 2014, the WSSC water main replacement project from 2012 and 2016, the recent WGL improvements, and any changes to trees

within the Village right of way. The GIS update is on hold. The Village RFP has been issued and a response is due by July 15th.

#### CC@ H JUNE EVENTS

**On Thursday, June 1, 7:00 to 9:30 p.m.**, CC@ H will present part two of our important series on Health Care and Aging: **When Times Get Tough: Facing Chronic Illness and End-of-Life Care.**

### **Think you might live in a Sears house? Historical Society project could confirm**

The Chevy Chase Historical Society is surveying Chevy Chase, Maryland, for "kit" houses - the well-built and enduring pre-cut houses offered by companies like Sears Roebuck, Montgomery Ward and Alladin Houses in the first half of the 20th century.

Starting in the early 1900s, Americans could order a complete "home by mail" from catalogues featuring hundreds of house styles and have the parts delivered, in stages, to the nearest railroad station. Kit houses were extremely popular in the 1920s and 1930s and have enjoyed a resurgence in recent years, as evidenced by the higher home prices that confirmed kit houses can command.

If you know or think you have a kit house and are willing to be contacted by the Chevy Chase Historical Society or a kit house scholar working with CCHS, email a
