FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Dear Fellow Residents,

It has been a busy month with committee meetings-both the Ethics and Election Committees as well as the Council-a special thank you to the residents who have volunteered for those committees. The Community Engagement Committee has outlined events for the Halloween Parade and party to take place on Halloween Day. It will give kids-and all the kids within us-a chance to dress up and give adults and kids a parade to show off those great costumes.



We are also trying something new this year to pick-up leaves. As usual, the Village will collect bags of yard waste on Monday's. Additionally, for leaves that are raked

next to the curb (but NOT on the street), a truck will vacuum them up every other Wednesday starting mid-October. The Village office will be sending out an announcement when the vacuuming will begin-early enough so you can get your leaves to the curb.

We need the help of every resident. As you have read in previous messages from the Village office, the Montgomery County Planning Board is considering a re-designation of Brookville Road from "Primary Residential" to "Minor Arterial" which could have the effect of adding more traffic to Brookville Road, which is already overcrowded, including bus and increased large vehicles. This is not an issue just for those living along Brookville Road. It affects all of us who use Brookville Road which at times is difficult to access from our streets because of the heavy traffic. It also poses an increased threat to anyone who uses the sidewalks along Brookville Road, especially the school children who are going and coming back from school during times of heavy traffic.

HOT TOPICS

Proposed Reclassification of Brookville Road

As many of you are aware, the Montgomery County Planning Board recently came out with its Master Plan of Highways and Transitways. One element of the proposal in particular has the potential to effect Martin's Additions: the reclassification of Brookville Road from "primary residential" to "minor arterial". The County has said that this reclassification is primarily based on the fact that more than 50% of traffic on Brookville Road is through-traffic, rather than from residents who live right by. However, there is great concern that codifying this change could be detrimental to the residential nature of the area, and that it is an incremental step towards encouraging more traffic, ride-on buses, and trucks to drive down Brookville to alleviate congestion on Connecticut Avenue. In other words, we are concerned that the County does not recognize the uptick in traffic on Brookville to be the problem that it is.

Prior to the September Council Meeting, the Village hosted a meeting regarding the County's proposed reclassification of Brookville Road. Below is some of the information that we gathered. We encourage all residents to write to the

Montgomery County Planning Board, or at least comment on their web page (<http://mcatlas.org/mpohtcomments/>). It is imperative that concerned residents make their opinions heard, and encourage others to speak out as well. The Planning Board has made it clear that resident comments and letters will be weighed heavily and given strong consideration when they make their ultimate decision on the proposal.

Subject: Master Plan of Highways and Transitways - Brookville Road (or leave this last part blank if you are commenting on multiple issues)

Many of the concerns that were raised at the meeting are perfect examples of things to cite as testimony against the reclassification. We have, and should use, a number of facts that support our claim that Brookville Road is unique, and therefore should not be considered as an arterial street. The ideas that were discussed at the September 21 meeting included:

- Brookville Road currently has truck restrictions based on engineering recommendations (a fact that was originally missed by the County Planning Board). Most arterial roads do not have such restrictions. The change in classification would further muddy the water on those restrictions, as we already have violations on a too-frequent basis.
- There are a number of dead-end streets that empty onto Brookville Road, as well as a number of driveways on Brookville. Codifying the street as "minor arterial," and thereby encouraging, large volume of through-traffic makes getting out of the dead-end streets and especially driveways not only more difficult, but more dangerous.
- The reclassification would exacerbate existing safety concerns for pedestrians, particularly children and elderly residents. A number of schools are in the nearby vicinity, including Blessed Sacrament, Chevy Chase Elementary School, and a preschool at the Chevy Chase United Methodist Church. At the outreach meeting on September 18, a young student commented that she and her friends are always nervous walking to school. It should be noted that Chevy Chase Elementary encourages its students to walk to school.
- Brookville Road has always been a pedestrian through-way. It is the only street that transverses the entirety of Martin's Additions. It is a major pedestrian avenue for residents of Martin's Additions and nearby municipalities as they walk to school, the market area, and towards the Western Avenue circle.
- There is also concern regarding the increased volume of pollutants in the neighborhood caused by excessive automobile traffic, which in turn can cause health problems for the young children and elderly residents who frequently walk on the street, as evidenced by the build-up of grime on residents' porches and property that directly abut Brookville Road.
- In general the sidewalks are very narrow. Pedestrians are often forced to walk into the street, particularly if passing someone or if two people are walking by each other in opposite directions.
- The right-of-way area as a whole is very narrow - in some cases, virtually non-existent beyond the road itself - and is not conducive to the street being

used in an arterial manner. The County Planning Board lists the right-of-way as being 70 ft. At its widest, that may be the case, but the County Planning Board should focus instead on the areas where the right-of-way is narrowest, or the median width at the very least.

- The County has also recommended Brookville Road be added as a shared road for bicyclists as part of its Master Bike Plan. The idea that the street should be reclassified as a minor arterial street seems diametrically opposed to the County's stated vision of providing "access to a comfortable, safe, and connected bicycle network." The Bicycle Master Plan says it focuses on bicyclists who are "less tolerant of bicycling close to traffic."
- Overall, reclassification would codify Brookville Road as a safety valve/pass-through for nearby congested highways (e.g., Connecticut Ave.). For the reasons stated above, the cut-through traffic should be approached as a problem to be solved or abated, rather than embraced and etched into stone.

The Village Council is in the midst of drafting a letter of its own to be sent to the Planning Board - and we will be sure to share that with residents once we have completed it. But there is power in numbers! We encourage residents to spread the word and ask neighbors in Martin's Additions and other nearby municipalities to comment or send in a letter. We are also hoping to get video and picture evidence that highlights the danger in allowing more cars through. Thank you to the residents who have reached out and taken an active role in this process

SPOTLIGHT

Leaf Vacuuming Services This Fall

This year, in addition to providing leaf bags for residents, the Village will be providing leaf vacuuming services, beginning in October. The Village has selected Lee's Trees, which has provided the same service in Section 5 for many years.

Leaf Vacuuming will be every other Wednesday, beginning on October 18th, weather permitting, and will last through October and November (we may extend into December depending on the need). Residents should rake their leaves to the edge of the curb or sidewalk (but not in the street, which is a violation of Montgomery County law), and Lee's Trees will send a three-man crew in a leaf vacuuming truck around the Village, suck them up, and haul them away. In the event of cancellation due to weather, the Village will send out notification to let you know when service will be rescheduled.

This year will represent a trial run, so the Village will send out a survey after leaf vacuuming is complete to get feedback and how the service can be improved, and whether to continue to offer, in future years.

Also, the Village will provide leaf bags for residents, with deliveries happening within the next few weeks. Waste Management will continue to do yard clipping pickups on Mondays, as they have always done.

NOTES FROM THE VILLAGE OFFICE

Overhanging Vegetation into the Sidewalk:

We have had a couple of instances in the Village where shrubbery or small trees have encroached into the right-of-way in a way that impedes pedestrian traffic. Please be mindful of pedestrians, and keep sidewalks and rights-of-way clear for pedestrians and others using the sidewalk.

Village Website:

The Village has almost completed its new website, which was designed by Revize. Village staff is in the midst of getting the new site up-to-date, and making sure all the information is migrated over before it "goes live." The new website will have some new features, such as the ability for residents to log in and access an online directory, and the ability to translate the page into hundreds of different languages. Once we have all the kinks worked out, we will launch it for residents to use, and you will see something very new when you log on to www.martinsadditions.org. We are excited about the changes, and we hope you will come to love them as well! We anticipate the new site going live in the next two to three weeks.

Street Lights:

Another month, another Pepco delay... Pepco was supposed to *finally* begin installations - starting on Raymond Street - this past week, but when the contractor showed up on Monday, September 25th they realized they were missing a piece of equipment that connects the light to the pole. While we wait for the missing pieces to be manufactured and delivered, Pepco will begin to install the seven new poles in the Village, beginning on Summit Avenue, the first week of October. The new pole locations were selected to more evenly distribute light and cover any dark patches. By the time the new poles are installed, we should hopefully have all the equipment needed for the lights, and the new streetlights should begin to be put in place.

This project has been in the works for many years, so while the long wait and delays are frustrating, it is exciting that we are coming to its culmination.

Halloween:

The Community Engagement Committee has taken on the heavy lifting for Halloween preparations. This year the Village will be hosting its annual Halloween celebration on Halloween night itself - October 31st. The Village has hired a pizza truck at the cul-de-

sac of Turner Lane, which will have cheese, pepperoni, and buffalo chicken options for kids and adults, as well as drinks. We'll also be providing adult beverages for those 21 and older. The pizza truck is scheduled to arrive at 4:30pm, so residents young and old can stop by any time between 4:30pm and 6:30pm to get food and drink.

The main draw of the event will be a Halloween Parade, which will begin at about 5:30pm. Parents and kids are all encouraged to dress up and meet in the Brookville Market area, and march down Turner Lane towards the cul-de-sac. Residents can then mingle, get some food, and listen to spooky tunes before heading out to trick-or-treat whenever they'd like. The event will be shutting down around 6:30pm.

We believe and hope that this plan will get more adults and kids in costume, and should make Halloween arrangements less stressful for parents. Having the event on Halloween will reduce the need to dress up multiple times, and allow the Village to feed the kids on a hectic night while helping them feel like Halloween has begun. Finally, we hope that by putting the emphasis on the parade, it will encourage people to come out and watch!

WSSC Returns:

As you may recall (or deal with on a daily basis...), a few streets in the Village were not repaved in anticipation of WSSC returning to the Village, unfortunately - sewer line repairs this time!!! Residents on those streets: you have not been forgotten! We will double back and get that work done on your streets once WSSC is finally out of our hair, hopefully for a long while.

WSSC originally anticipated work to begin in the spring. Then it was late summer. Then it was late September/early October. Well, here we are, and they have still not selected a contractor. They are now expecting a contract to be put in place in December, and for work to begin shortly after. I would not expect work to begin in the dead of winter, so spring of 2018 is probably more likely. But before any work begins WSSC will have a public outreach meeting to go over plans and what to expect. We will make sure to keep you informed of any developments.

Noise and Construction Hours:

A reminder that the Village follows Montgomery County's Noise Law, which allows for 65 dBA (decibels) during the daytime, and 55 dBA at nighttime. An example that may violate that section of the law might include lawn-mowing at night, for example. [This sheet](#) might also give you an idea of what those numbers roughly translate to. Typically the Village suggests contacting the County if there is a noise disturbance

because they have the equipment to assess decibel levels and the resources to issue citations. If you wish to report a noise violation, you can contact Montgomery County 3-1-1 during regular business hours, or the non-emergency police line at 301-279-8000 during non-business hours. There is also a two-party complaint form found online on the [Montgomery County website](#).

The rules for construction are slightly different, and are handled a little differently too. Construction in the Village shall not commence prior to 7:00 am on Monday through Friday, and 9:00 am on Saturday and Sunday; and must end no later than 9:00 pm Monday through Thursday, and 7:00 pm Friday through Sunday, and on federal holidays - *INCLUDING COLUMBUS DAY*. Between 7:00 am and 5:00 pm on weekdays, construction work is allowed to get up to 75 dBA, and up to 85 dBA if there is a Montgomery-County approved noise suppression plan for the project. Again, if you would like to report a violation you can contact the County. You can also inform the Village office, which can also issue citations for working beyond permitted construction work hours.

2016 Resident Directory:

Extra copies are available in the Village office. The directory is published every two years, so the next update will be available in 2018. The Village is beginning to compile contact info for the 2018 directory. We would like to get information from everyone this year to make sure we are up-to-date. Please stay tuned for more information.

As mentioned above, the new Village website will also have the capability of allowing residents access to an online version of the directory; only accessible to residents of Martin's Additions.

Permitting:

Please remember to contact the Village office before beginning any work to verify permitting requirements. Work performed on your property may require permits from the Village as well as from Montgomery County. See the "Building Blocks" section of the newsletter for the latest!

Moving?

Residents of VMA are encouraged to contact the office to have temporary No Parking signs posted in front of their home when moving out of the Village or when expecting a large truck delivery. We have implemented a new system whereby residents fill out a form that can be submitted via email or in person (available on the Village website), so that there is no confusion about moving dates/times.

Other items:

- To receive Constant Contact notifications from the Village Council, the committees, and the office (i.e., any official communication from your Village government), please contact the Village office. This is the best way to receive information on waste pickup, snow removal, and Council and committee meetings.
- To receive a paper copy of *Martin's Edition* in the mail, please contact the Village office.

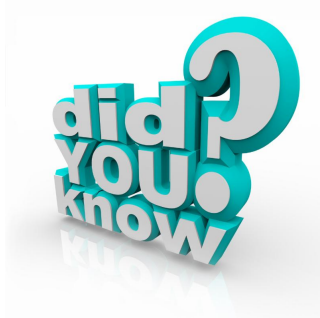

BUILDING BLOCKS

BUILDING ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

6701 Brookville Rd.

The applicant has submitted a building permit application to add an addition at the rear of the existing house. The staff has completed a preliminary review of the application and is waiting for the Montgomery County Department of Permitting Services (MCDPS) building permit approval.

7210 Chestnut St.

The Montgomery County Department of Transportation (MCDOT) had previously issued a demo permit and the applicant had applied for a demo permit from the Village. They then decided to put the project on hold. The MCDOT demo permit will

expire soon. The owners will be renewing the MCDOT demo permit and posting the bond for the Village demo permit this fall. The staff requested the owners to keep the property neat, free of debris, and the grass cut, until the demo begins. The homeowners are planning to remove the ex. house in Nov.

3405 Cummings La.

The applicant has submitted for a building permit from MCDPS and the Village. The Village issued a building permit on 9/11/17 and construction has begun.

7210 Delfield St.

The homeowner has planted rose bushes and other plants, outside the new fence at the front of the property and within the Village right of way. A right of way license agreement was prepared for the plantings in the Village right of way. We are waiting for the homeowner to return the executed and notarized agreement, which will be recorded in the land records at Montgomery County.

6702 Melville St.

The Village has issued a building permit to enclose the breezeway between the existing house and garage. The work is ongoing and appears to be near completion.

3404 Shepherd St.

An application has been submitted to add a second floor, a covered front porch, and a covered patio to the existing house. The application has been reviewed. The staff has issued a Village building permit and the work is proceeding. The applicant has submitted a certified height survey, which indicates the addition is in accordance with the Village Code.

7200 Summit Ave.

The building permit for a bay window has been issued and the construction is ongoing.

3510 Taylor Street

The staff has noticed that the existing brick retaining wall within the Village right of way is collapsing, is a safety hazard, and is in need of immediate repair. The staff is attempting to contact the homeowner. A right of way license will be required.

3512 Taylor Street

The staff noticed that when the retaining wall was re-built, the contractor left a 2-inch-wide depressed area between the existing Village sidewalk and the base of the new wall, which may cause a pedestrian to trip and fall. The staff is attempting to contact the homeowner to correct the situation.

3407 Thornapple St.

The staff issued a building permit to relocate the existing house from the adjacent lot and add improvements to the old structure. The improvements include a new curb cut and driveway. The work has begun and the existing house has been moved to the adjacent lot. The applicant has poured a new driveway and apron and replaced a section of damaged curb. However, several sections of ex. curb have chips and cracks and I recommend they also be replaced.

MCDOT - North Delfield St.

The staff has contacted the MCDOT maintenance department about repairing the existing storm drain inlet at the north end of North Delfield St. MCDOT is not sure who owns the damaged inlet and they are still investigating the situation.

MSHA - Brookville Road

Maryland State Highway Administration (MSHA) maintenance staff is investigating the water ponding at the northeast corner of Brookville Rd. and Bradley La. MSHA was recently contacted and they are still looking into a solution for the ponding water.

A. Morton Thomas GIS Update

AMT last updated the Village Graphical Interface System (GIS) computer data in 2014. In the spring, a Request For Proposals was sent out. The Village has received three proposals and they are being reviewed by the staff.

HEARD ON THE SIDEWALK

WEATHER OUTLOOK:

After a cooler than normal first half to September, and a warmer than normal second half, we should now expect more typical weather for October. Looking ahead to winter 2017-2018. expect colder temperatures than last winter, with more snow.

Last winter was the second warmest on record for the Washington, DC metro area. Snowfall was only four inches, with practically all of that coming in March. However, expect this coming winter to be milder than normal, with snowfall around 12 inches officially, with higher amounts in the environs. Also be prepared for a couple of ice storms!

So, mild and wet overall for December through February. In the meanwhile, the fall foliage should be very vivid this fall given our very wet summer into early September. Peak color will come here around Halloween and the first week of November.

Child Care Counts

For many families today, child care is essential -- and expensive - full-time care at a licensed center costs an average of \$22,631 for an infant in our area!

Last year, VMA resident Debbie Brown started a nonprofit (501(c)(3)) organization called Child Care Counts to help address this problem for families in the Metro DC area. The organization offers a limited number of "scholarships" for child care costs for families to send their children to a quality, state-licensed child care centers in Prince George's, Howard, Montgomery and Fairfax counties. All clients must be working full-time (or close to it) and cannot be eligible for public vouchers for child care. All clients pay a portion of the cost of care. Some of the parents are also attending college full-time to improve their career and life prospects.

Child Care Counts will be holding a fundraiser on November 7th at Le Bar (at La Ferme) from 6:30pm - 8:30pm. A portion of the proceeds from that evening will be donated by La Ferme to Child Care Counts. More information will be coming as the date draws closer, but mark your calendars now!
